

Mo Ibrahim Foundation announces there will be no winner of the 2023 Ibrahim Prize for Achievement in African Leadership

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London, UK, 20 March 2024 - Today, the Mo Ibrahim Foundation has announced that there will be no winner of the 2023 Ibrahim Prize for Achievement in African Leadership.

The Ibrahim Prize is a prize awarded in recognition of exceptional leadership. The prize is only awarded when a candidate meets the rigorous selection criteria set out by the Prize Committee, meaning it is not necessarily awarded every year.

The decision not to award the Prize for the year 2023 was taken following deliberations by the independent Prize Committee. Announcing the decision, Prize Committee Chair Festus Mogae commented:

"Having carefully considered the list of leaders who have achieved their constitutional mandate in the last three years, and were therefore eligible for the 2023 award, the Prize Committee has decided there will be no Laureate"

The criteria for a candidate to be eligible for the Prize are:

- Former executive heads of state or government of an African country;
- Have ended their constitutional mandate in the last three years;
- · Have been democratically elected;
- · Have demonstrated exceptional leadership.

This marks the third consecutive year in which the Ibrahim Prize has not been awarded.

The Ibrahim Prize

- Recognises and celebrates African leaders who, under challenging circumstances, have developed their countries, strengthened democracy and paved the way for a sustainable and equitable future for their citizens;
- · Highlights exceptional leadership role models for the continent;
- Ensures that the African continent continues to benefit from the experience and wisdom of exceptional leaders once they have left national office, by enabling them to work beyond their own countries once their mandate has ended:
- Is an award and a standard for excellence in leadership in Africa, and not a 'first prize' there is not necessarily a Laureate every year.

2023 Ibrahim Prize

There were seven former heads of State or Government considered for the 2023 Ibrahim Prize, having been democratically elected and whose mandate ended in the past three years (2021-2022-2023).

- 1. Mandate ended in 2021: Jorge Carlos Fonseca, former President of Cabo Verde
- 2. Mandate ended in 2021: Evaristo Carvalho, former President of Sao Tomé e Príncipe
- 3. Mandate ended in 2021: Edgar Lungu, former President of Zambia
- 4. Mandate ended in 2022: Uhuru Kenyatta, former President of Kenya
- 5. Mandate ended in 2022: Mohammed Abdulahi Mohammed, former President of Somalia
- 6. Mandate ended in 2023: George Weah, former President of Liberia
- 7. Mandate ended in 2023: Muhammadu Buhari, former President of Nigeria

The Ibrahim Prize is the largest awarded prize in the world, consisting of:

• US\$5 million over ten years

The winner of the Ibrahim Prize is selected by an independent Prize Committee, appointed by the Foundation Board, comprised of:

Prize Laureates

Since being launched in 2006, the Ibrahim Prize has been awarded seven times. The previous Laureates are Mahamadou Issoufou of Niger (2020), Ellen Johnson Sirleaf of Liberia (2017), President Hifikepunye Pohamba of Namibia (2014), President Pedro Pires of Cabo Verde (2011), President Festus Mogae of Botswana (2008), and President Joaquim Chissano of Mozambique (2007). Nelson Mandela was the inaugural Honorary Laureate in 2007.
